FOR OUR SCHOOLS

n behalf of the Board of Education, staff and students, thank you for our new and expanded facilities. Your support is appreciated and valued. We have wonderful, safe schools in which to educate the future of our community because of your generosity.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Two of three constructions projects are complete, while a third remains underway. We are proud to share all projects are under budget with a total savings of about \$9 million.

Voters approved a \$75 million school bond issue in November 2008 for three major projects. However, the Board of Education delayed a portion of projects because of sagging economic conditions. The district's current bond issue is now on hold at \$52 million. Board members expressed concern for taxpayers and cited the need to closely monitor the district's property tax impact.

WHAT'S NEW

The school year begins with the opening of the district's seventh elementary school, Belmont Elementary, located at 5805 Belmont in Shawnee.

The school serves children in Kindergarten through grade five and is also home to the district's special education early childhood program.

Another major project was at Mill Valley High School in Shawnee. The facility was expanded to accommodate a capacity of 1,450 students. This was the school's second expansion since opening in the year 2000.

Work is currently underway on Phase I expansion of De Soto High School in the city of De Soto. When construction is complete, the school will have eight new classrooms, a new corridor, and a new secure main entrance.

IN PROGRESS - THE DHS EXPANSION - PHASE ONE

The Board of Education worked with HTK Architects (Horst, Terrill, & Karst) to develop a plan to expand De Soto High School in phases. The district is in the middle of phase one to address the more critical and immediate space needs.

Construction is underway to build eight (8) new classrooms and renovate existing space, which is part of the original bond issue plan. The project should be completed in 2011 at a cost of less than \$3 million.

WHAT'S IN THE INITIAL **DHS EXPANSION?**

The project consists of two additions and minor interior renovations. Additions: 15,000 square feet Renovations: 4,500 square feet Total Square Feet = 19,500

ADDITIONS

The Fine Arts addition will consist of five (5) classrooms with associated spaces for the addition.

- The addition will have an attached Mechanical/Electrical addition to provide infrastructure for the Phase I addition and future infrastructure for Phase II expansion.

The Flex Classroom/Corridor Link Addition will consist of three (3) flex classrooms adjacent to the

existing Commons Area with a new corridor link for student foot traffic. The addition will have an attached Mechanical/ Electrical addition to provide infrastructure for the Phase I project and future infrastructure for Phase II expansion.

RENOVATIONS

- The Secure Entry renovation will consist of inserting a new door from the existing south main entrance vestibule to the main administration area. This will allow the entrance to be locked down during school hours forcing all visitors into the administrative office.
- The Project Lead the Way renovation will update the old art classroom to accommodate the pre-engineering program. The existing art class will be relocated to the new Fine Arts addition.

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FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)

he Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records. These rights transfer to the student when he or she reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond the high school level. Students to whom the rights have transferred are "eligible students."

Parents or eligible students have the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the school. Schools are not required to provide copies of records unless, for reasons such as great distance, it is impossible for parents or eligible students to review the records. Schools may charge a fee for copies.

Parents or eligible students have the right to request that a school correct records which they believe to be inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student then has the right to a formal

hearing. After the hearing, if the school still decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record setting forth his or her view about the contested information.

Generally, schools must have written permission from the parent or eligible student in order to release any information from a student's education record. However, FERPA allows schools to disclose those records, without consent, to the following parties or under the following conditions (34 CFR § 99.31):

- School officials with legitimate educational interest;
- · Other schools to which a student is transferring:
- Specified officials for audit or evaluation purposes:
- · Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
- Organizations conducting certain studies for or on behalf of the school;
- Accrediting organizations;
- · To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena;
- · Appropriate officials in cases of health and safety emergencies; and

· State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific State law.

Schools may disclose, without consent, "directory" information such as a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, honors and awards, and dates of attendance. However, schools must tell parents and eligible students about directory information and allow

parents and eligible students a reasonable amount of time to request that the school not disclose directory information about them. Schools must notify parents and eligible students annually of their rights under FERPA. The actual means of notification (special letter, inclusion in a PTA bulletin, student handbook, or newspaper article) is left to the discretion of each school.





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NOTICE FOR DIRECTORY INFORMATION

he Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that De Soto Unified School District #232, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, USD #232 may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow USD #232 to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples

- A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- · The annual yearbook;
- · Honor roll or other recognition lists;
- · Graduation programs;
- Sports activity sheets, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members, and;
- District newsletter.

 Directory information, which

is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories - names, addresses and telephone listings - unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.(1)

If you do not want USD #232 to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, then you must notify the District in writing by September 10. USD #232 has designated the following information as directory information:

- · Student's name
- · Participation in officially

recognized activities and sports

- Address
- Telephone listing (only for military & institutions of higher learning)
- Weight and height of members of athletic teams
- Photograph
- · Degrees, honors, and awards received
- · Major field of study

- · Dates of attendance
- Grade level
- The most recent educational agency or institution attended

Footnotes: 1.These laws are: Section 9528 of the ESEA (20 U.S.C. 7908), as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (PL. 107-110), the education bill, and 10 U.S.C. 503, as amended by section 544, the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2002 (PL. 107-107), the legislation that provides funding for the Nation's armed forces.

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ACTIVITY PARTICIPATION FEES

WHAT IS THE ACTIVITY PARTICIPATION FEE?

The Board of Education approved the fee to help offset the cost of providing extracurricular student activities in grades 6 through 12. The fee, which is for the whole year, includes all sports, activities, clubs, and other extra programs.

WHY IS THERE A NEW FEE?

The reason for the new fee is due to reductions in funding from the state of Kansas and limited funds at the local level. The fee will help the school district sustain current student activities and athletic programs.

HOW WILL THE MONEY BE SPENT?

The fee will help offset the cost of supplemental contracts for teachers who provide direction or supervision of extracurricular activities. Examples include club/activity sponsors and coaches. The district estimates the fee will generate \$100,000.

The fee will not replace other charges for programs or activities required for participation in the activity or program.

DO OTHER DISTRICTS IN THE AREA HAVE ACTIVITY PARTICIPATION FEES?

Yes. This particular fee is based on a model adopted by the Blue Valley School District in 2007.

PARTIAL LISTING OF EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES:

National Honor Society, student council, publications, pep club, Scholars Bowl, Science Olympiad, robotics, musicals, FHA, Knowledge Bowl, football, basketball, track, wrestling, cheerleading, baseball, softball, volleyball, soccer, cross country, tennis, golf, drama, instrumental music, vocal music, forensics, debate, drill team, dance, weight training, yearbook, newspaper, LITE Leadership, flag team, color guard, etc.

PURPOSE OF THE FEE:

To help support the costs of extracurricular activities and programs in the district.

WHEN COLLECTED:

At time of registration.

AMOUNT OF FEE:

\$50 for grades 9-12; \$30 for grade 8; \$25 for grade 7; \$10 for grade 6.

PAYMENT PLANS:

Yes, payment plans may be arranged with the school for student fees.

WAIVER OF FEE:

Yes. The fee is waived for students qualifying for Free/Reduced lunch.

REFUNDS:

Yes. The district will refund the fee for any students who did not participate in any extracurricular activity, school club, or any other non-required activity offered by the school. Parents must complete a Fee Refund Form and submit it by June 1 of the current school year.

MAXIMUM PER HOUSEHOLD:

For families with multiple children from one household in the same school, the fee will be collected for no more than two students in the highest grade level at that school. The maximum per household fee will be \$100 for grades 9-12 and \$60 for grades 6-8.



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

STATE AWARD HONORS MVHS SOCIAL WORKER

ebbie Gudenkauf keeps coming back year after The Mill Valley High School social worker can't get enough of helping kids. The reason?

"Knowing that I can make a difference in kids' lives and their families' lives," she said.

With a new school year on the horizon, Gudenkauf is looking back on an eventful summer. It began the week after school let out this spring. She was sitting at her desk finishing reports for the school year when she got the call.

"I was working late on budget stuff for a grant," she said. "I got a call that I had been nominated and selected as Social Worker of the Year by the Kansas Association of School Social Workers."

The call came as quite a surprise to Gudenkauf, who had no idea she had even been nominated. Joe Kordalski, De Soto High School social worker, had entered her name on the sly earlier in the spring.

"That was the first I'd heard about it," Gudenkauf said. "I had no idea, but the principal and special education director had written letters of recommendation. It brought tears to my eyes. At that point in the year, you've worked so hard and you're tired. It's nice to know that others see what you've done."

As part of being selected as Social Worker of the Year. Gudenkauf will travel to Minneapolis for the Midwest School Social Worker Conference. There, she'll attend workshops on how to better communicate social work results to administrators within schools.

"So much is confidential that it can be hard to get across how much we impact student lives," she said. "I'm very excited about that and to learn what others do to help others understand the impact."

Gudenkauf was also recognized at De Soto USD

'That was really nice," she said. "I got to know Dr. (Ron) Wimmer (superintendent) this year. He took an interest in some of our kids. Most people don't know or understand the nature of our work. It was an award on behalf of all social workers in the district."

After 21 years in the USD 232 school district and 33 years as a social worker, Gudenkauf can't imagine doing anything else.

She started her career working in residential treatment and then went to Shawnee Mission Hospital while receiving her master's degree in social work. Soon after finishing her master's she heard about the job in the De Soto district.

"A lot of my family has been involved in education," she said of making the choice to work in schools. "I grew up knowing that education was very important. It's the ticket to be able to do what you want to do."

Gudenkauf has worked with students at every level within the district. She's currently stationed at Mill Valley High School, where she works with students on a variety of issues, such as mental health, anxiety, family dynamics, substance abuse, and grief and loss.

Whether a student just needs to talk or work out issues with art therapy, Gudenkauf is there.

"For example anxiety issues," she said. "If a student is anxious about a test, we will do breathing exercises to relax. I'll tell them to close their eyes and visualize themselves taking the test. We'll do positive self talk and teach them to recall what they've studied. They'll become more confident."


Gudenkauf often uses cognitive behavior approaches to help students think through what is happening.

"You use the approach to help them see what would happen if they did this," she said. "It helps them problem solve and it empowers them. It's all about teaching lifelong skills."

Gudenkauf couldn't imagine doing anything other than working with students.

"I've always been a social worker at heart," she said. "There were instances in elementary school when I stood up for people. It's always who I've been.

"I love what I do and I really want kids to leave Mill Valley not only with math and science knowledge but to know that even if they suffer from mental health issues they can get through it. They have the resources in them and they will know where they can reach out."

The weeklong day camp, in its second year in the district, is designed to allow students to unleash their creative genius through individual and teambuilding activities.

This year, 83 campers took part in a variety of activities each day.

Hayden Knight, who will be a thirdgrader at Mize Elementary, attended the camp for a second year.

"It's really fun and you get to learn about new stuff," he said. "In school they don't make it as fun; the people that work here are making it fun to learn."

Hayden's favorite activity for the week was Hatched, a module that combines online virtual worlds to relay economic solutions to problems. Students work in teams to create thriving worlds.

Kate Miller, who will enter fifth grade at Prairie Ridge Elementary, also attended the camp for her second year.

"It was a lot of fun, and I like science, so I wanted to come back," she said.

Kate said one reason she liked the camp was that she could review concepts she learned at school the previous year.

"You don't build as much in school and you don't go into the halls and stuff," she said. "Camp is hands-on; it makes it more interesting."

Other activities included:

- · Power'd, where students explore new types of energy and learn about wind, solar and hydro energy by creating creatures using battery circuits.
- SMArt: Science, Math & Art, in which students use imagination, creative problem-solving and math to create patterns.
- · I Can Invent III, where students built machines from recycled materials and broken appliances.
- Global Games, in which students study sports such as lacrosse, soccer and dice.

Kathy McBride, camp coordinator for the district, said this year's camp was more student led.

"When kids are engaged and involved, the amount of things retained are more validated," she said.

McBride said the camp received a strong turnout from primary grades.

"It's exciting to see them (students) excited in math and science," she said. "I hope they learn they truly are the makers of their own destiny, that if they have great ideas they can make them."

ever believe anyone who tells you dreams don't come true. That is a lesson Dolly Parton shared with about a thousand people gathered June 11, 2010, at Dollywood's Showstreet Palace. The country music superstar was back home in Sevier County to mark more milestones.

In addition to updates on the park's 25th Anniversary, flood relief efforts in Nashville and presenting the 25-millionth Imagination Library Book, Parton handed out the 2010 Chasing Rainbows Award. The teaching award went to Keil Hileman a middle school Social Studies and History Teacher at Monticello Trails Middle School in Shawnee, Kansas.

Dollywood Foundation director David Dotson joined Parton on stage to introduce Hileman. Dotson told the audience Hileman had overcome many obstacles in his life. At one point Hileman was told he would not be able to walk, be able to see or have children.

When Hileman walked on stage, it was obvious he had proved his critics wrong. Hileman towered over Parton and she commented on his beautiful family she had met prior to the presentation. Hileman has three children.

"We know how important it is for our kids to be inspired," said Parton. "We all have memories of teachers both good and bad, but hopefully good."

After receiving the Chasing Rainbows Award, Hileman told the crowd he was passionate about teaching and wouldn't want to do anything else. Earlier David Dotson had said Hileman "inspires his students to grow as learners, but he clearly inspires his students to grow as people."

The Chasing Rainbows Award recipient is chosen by the National State Teachers of the Year organization. The first award was given to Dolly Parton in 2002 during the dedication of the Chasing Rainbows Museum at Dollywood.



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
