STATE CHAMPIONS!

DE SOTO HIGH SCHOOL SCHOLARS' BOWL TEAM HAS BEST SEASON IN SCHOOL HISTORY

he De Soto High School Scholars' Bowl team won the Kansas 4A State Championship in Wellington, Kansas on Saturday, February 12. Team members are Crystal Wolf, Parker Riley, Robby Satterwhite, Ryan Endres, Philip Kaul, and Ryan Scott.

The Wildcats swept their initial pool with an undefeated 5-0 record, taking down last year's defending state champion, Topeka-Hayden. DHS then moved into the championship finals round robin and went 4 and 1 to claim the state title. The team, coached by Phil Hamilton, completed its best season in school history winning the league, regional, and state championships, as well as a total of ten overall varsity tournaments. "Special recognition goes to senior member and team captain Ryan Scott and senior members Ryan Endres and Crystal Wolf," said Coach Hamilton. "All of them

completed their fourth year of participation in Scholars' Bowl and completed their run with a State Championship. Special thanks also to all our teachers who do a wonderful job of preparing the students to meet any academic challenges they face." In Scholars' Bowl competition, teams must answer questions in math, science, language arts (English questions like grammar, spelling, literature etc.), foreign language (they have to translate a phrase that is given in French, German and Spanish to the English equivalent), social science, fine arts, and year in review.

STARSIDE ELEMENTARY TEACHER EARNS STATE ENDORSEMENT

Suzie Jacobsen was recognized by the Kansas State Department of Education in January for being one of 95 teachers in the state to receive a new Teacher Leader endorsement. Jacobsen attended a special ceremony at the Department of Education in Topeka representing region three in Kansas.

The Teacher Leader Endorsement was developed for career teachers with a Master's degree who have functioned as leaders among their colleagues. Jacobsen, a special education teacher at Starside Elementary, completed an evidencecentered assessment which was the pilot assessment for the Teacher Leader Endorsement in Kansas. "It was very exciting and fun to be part of the group honored at the Department of Education," said Jacobsen. "Meeting our state school board members and talking with them about education was a wonderful experience."

The new assessment consisted of six tasks requiring the submission of several artifacts documenting the work completed for each task. Lachelle L. Sigg was named director of human resources for USD 232 effective with the 2011-12 school year.

he Board of Education on Monday, February 14, accepted the district's recommendation to name Lachelle L. Sigg to serve as director of human resources effective with the 2011-12 school year.

Superintendent-Elect Doug Sumner, acting director of human resources, spent several weeks reviewing candidates who applied for the position. "Lachelle is an outstanding leader, a skilled recruiter and an exemplary communicator and problem solver," Sumner said. "I have every confidence in her abilities and know she will provide incredible support to our dedicated staff."

Ms. Sigg currently serves in the Gardner Edgerton School District as principal of Pioneer Ridge Middle School where she recently earned the 2010 Exemplary Principal Award from the Kansas Association of Middle School Principals. She also has administrative experience at the intermediate level and has been a lead recruiter at the elementary and middle school level for several years. "I am proud to be joining the leadership team in USD 232," Sigg said. "I look forward to recruiting the very best educators to further the already outstanding achievements of the school district." Ms. Sigg began her career in public education in the De Soto School District in 2001 as a school psychologist. 



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SUMMER MAINTENANCE PROJECTS, SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION... WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE FUNDING

o doubt you have seen construction crews at Mill Valley High School, De Soto High School, and Belmont Elementary during the last several months. And chances are you will see maintenance activities at other schools during the summer focusing on various projects from repairing sidewalks, replacing old carpet, roof repair, and other improvements.

What you may wonder is how the district pays for these projects at a time when school budgets have been reduced across the state of Kansas. The district uses two funds to help with these needs throughout the year -- Bond Funds for major construction and Capital Outlay Funds for smaller projects and the maintenance and upkeep of our facilities.

These funds are restricted by Kansas statute and cannot be used to pay for teachers, support staff, or regular classroom supplies. The Capital Outlay Fund, for example, has a myriad of state guidelines and is only "for the purpose of acquisition, construction, reconstruction, repair, remodeling, additions to, furnishing and equipping of buildings necessary for school district purposes...."

INCLEMENT WEATHER DAYS STUDENTS WILL ATTEND SCHOOL ON MONDAY, APRIL 25



As of February 3, the school district used six (6) inclement weather days during the current school year (January 10, 11, 20, Feb. 1, 2, and 3). We have exceeded the number of snow days (4) built into the calendar for this purpose.

One make-up day will be Monday, April 25, 2011, originally a scheduled day off for students. District officials will wait to see what the weather may hold in the coming weeks to determine the amount of time that will need to be made up and how that time will be scheduled. This information will be communicated when it becomes available.

The district plans each school year calendar to include four (4) inclement weather days, which has historically been sufficient. In contrast, the district did not use any snow days during the 2008-09 school year.


